

December 21 COVID Contingency Plan

This document is intended to be read alongside the COVID Risk Assessment and the COVID Policy

Expectations of the Department of Education:

All education settings should already have contingency plans describing what they would do if children, pupils, students or staff test positive for COVID-19, or how they would operate if they were advised to reintroduce any measures described in this document to help break chains of transmission. COVID-19 resilience and planning is now more important than ever.

A good plan should cover:

- roles and responsibilities
- when and how to seek public health advice

• details on the types of control measures you might be asked to put in place (described in measures that settings should plan for and your sector's guidance) For each control measure you should include:

• actions you would take to put it in place quickly.

• how you would ensure every child, pupil or student receives the quantity and quality of education and support to which they are normally entitled.

• how you would communicate changes to children, pupils, students, parents, carers and staff.

Single children or or staff members show symptoms for COVID-19	Person will be sent home to do a PCR test and advised to isolate. In the case of a child, they will be moved to the isolation room to be collected by a parent and advised to follow public health advice. If close contact is necessary whilst waiting, staff member should wear PPE (mask at the least). When a positive case is reported, communicate this with the rest of the school. Report positive case to the LA. Inform school community.	SLT

Local Outbreak	Thomas's Academy will continue to work with health protection teams in the case of a local outbreak. If there is a substantial increase in the number of positive cases or if central government offers the area an enhanced response package, a director of public health might advise a school to temporarily reintroduce some control measures. Remote education

High-quality remote learning will be provided for all pupils from day 2 if:

- they have tested positive for COVID-19 but are well enough to learn from home; or
- attendance at their setting has been temporarily restricted

We will lend digital resources and stationery to pupils where necessary. Staff will communicate with parents via email.

All remote learning will:

- Be of equivalent length to the core teaching pupils would receive in school
- Include daily work in a number of different subjects, and staff will monitor pupils' engagement
- Include a planned and sequenced curriculum so that knowledge and skills are built incrementally, with clarity about what's intended to be taught and practised in each subject
- Provide frequent explanations of new content, delivered by a teacher in your school or through curriculum resources and/or videos
- Use digital platforms (Tapestry, Seesaw, Google Classroom) unless the family prefer printed resources

When there are 5 or more from one class engaging with remote learning:

• Include a daily Zoom in order that the children can connect with a staff member and have the opportunity to discuss the learning

Where it is the entire class engaging with remote learning (with some vulnerable children/children of critical workers in school):

- Include a morning Zoom each day to introduce the learning
- Include a daily English/Maths meeting (Y1 6)
- Include sessions where staff read to children each day (EY)
- Make use of published resources ie Oak Academy
- Include lessons from specialist teachers

We recognise that younger pupils and some pupils with SEND may not be able to access remote education without adult support, and so we will need to work with families to deliver our curriculum

Free school meals

We will continue to follow national guidance regarding the provision of free school meals support in the form of lunch parcels or vouchers for pupils who are eligible for benefits-related free school meals and who are not attending school because they have had symptoms or a positive test result themselves. These can be collected by family members or, if necessary, can be delivered by staff.

Educational visits

Any attendance restrictions should be reflected in the visits risk assessment and setting leaders should consider carefully if the educational visit is still appropriate and safe. Only students who are attending the setting should go on an educational visit. Education settings should consult the health and safety guidance on educational visits when considering visits.



Protocol for Symptomatic Children and Safe Use of PPE.

The main symptoms of COVID-19 are a temperature (37.8°C) or chest/back feeling hot to the touch) and/ or new, continuous cough, and/or a loss or change to the sense of smell or taste.

Please remind the children in your pod to let you know if any of them is feeling unwell.

If any child presents with any of these symptoms, please follow the following procedure:

1. Take the child directly to the Isolation Room (Welcome Room) ASAP.

2. One member of staff should stay with the child, while another goes to alert the office - do not take a child with suspected symptoms to the school office.

3. The member of staff who remains with the child should put on PPE if they have to be a close contact as outlined in the video below. While waiting for collection, the windows of the isolation room should be opened and the door closed. The member of staff should remain at least 2m away from the child.

4. Office staff should call parents and ask for the child to be collected immediately. Parents will be advised of the following points:

- To self-isolate and organise a COVID-19 test for their child and possibly the family.

- Symptomatic individuals should self-isolate for 10 days, or longer if still unwell or feverish

- If household members develop symptoms, they should isolate for 10 days (or longer if still unwell) from the start of their symptoms.

5. Once the child has been collected, any used PPE should be removed and disposed of into the yellow bin as per the attached video. The supervising staff member and the rest of the pod should wash hands thoroughly

6. The Isolation Room should be cleaned before future use.

7. Where there has been a positive case, any classrooms used that day by the individual should be cleaned with disinfectant by the cleaner

8. Unless a negative COVID-19 test result is provided, any child who has been sent home with suspected symptoms will be expected to stay at home for 10 days. On receipt of a negative PCR test result, a pupil or staff member may return.

.PPE is located in the isolation room and will be checked weekly by the head of First Aid.
