Attendance and Punctuality

The attendance rate for the children at Thomas's Academy has historically been high because you value your child's education and you know each day is important. However this academic year, our attendance figures have fallen below national average for the first time.

This is incredibly disappointing, as I'm sure you'll agree. Illness has certainly played a big factor in this, especially at the tail end of the Autumn term. Spring term attendance was similar to Autumn. Let's work together to make sure the ambition remains for excellent attendance during the Summer term.

Class attendance for the month of April 2023. Nursery is not statutory, therefore data is not included here.

Please note that we are obliged to contact the borough if a pupil has unauthorised absences that equate to more than 10% within a six-week period. This route will result in a Penalty Notice (PN) being issued or a referral to Family Services.

If there is a reason for your child to be absent, for example sickness or medical appointments, please email absent@academy.thomas-s.co.uk For absence requests, a form can be collected from the school office for Miss Kelly to consider.

Punctuality is also incredibly important. The classrooms open at 8.45am at which point children can enter and engage with learning activities - these tend to be maths revision and challenges to support children's retention of maths learning. The register is taken at 8.55am after which point children are marked late. School doors close at this time and children will only be able to enter via the front office.

We are also noticing an increasing level of parents/carers collecting their children late. Children should be collected promptly at the end of their school day. Any parent collecting after being 10 minutes late, their child may be sent to Shine Bright Club and parents/carers may be charged a minimum fee of £10.



Stay and Share Afternoon

Stay and Share My Learning: Friday, 26th May 2023 from 1.40pm

To manage the numbers, we would ask that only one parent or carer visits per family.

The children will have chosen pieces of work they are most proud of and marked it in their books with post it notes.

Your focus will be on sharing and praising your child for their effort and their progress so far this year, discussing all the interesting things they have learned. This will not be the right opportunity to have any in depth discussion with your child's teacher about their learning so please do not expect this.

If you have more than one child, please visit each one in their classroom's individually (staff will guide you to the right place) before collecting them all together and leaving. You are free to leave with them before the end of the school day if you wish. That weekend is a bank holiday weekend and marks the beginning of half term, so it may offer you the opportunity to make the most of the time.



Free School Meal (FSM) Information for Parents

We would like to encourage all families who think they may be eligible to benefits-related Free School Meal (FSM) to make an application through the Local Authority.

Not only will you receive a Free School from the date your application is successful, you will also be provided with a one-off clothes grant (from the Local Authority) and currently will be provided with retail vouchers for over the holiday periods (from the School).

For every pupil entitled to benefits related FSM, the school receives additional funding from the central government in the amount of £1,455 per student. This money funds valuable support like extra tuition, additional teaching staff or after school activities.

Families may be eligible for free school meals and clothing grants if they receive the following benefits:

- Universal Credit with an annual net earned income of no more than £7,400
- income support
- income based jobseeker's allowance
- income related employment and support allowance
- support under Part 6 of the Immigration and Asylum Act 1999
- the guarantee element of pension credit
- working tax credit run-on (paid for the four weeks after you stop qualifying for working tax credit)
- child tax credit (with no working tax credit) with an annual income of no more than £16,190.

Please note that applications must be made individually for each child, if you already have a child attending school who is entitled to FSM, this entitlement does not automatically transfer to siblings.

Sickness

It is important to minimise the spread of infection in schools as much as possible. If your child is unwell and has a fever, they should stay home from school or nursery until they feel better and the fever has resolved. We will be asking parents to collect children who are unwell. At school, we will be helping children to learn about the importance of good hand hygiene and practicing regular handwashing. Catching coughs and sneezes in tissues then binning them is another simple way to help stop illness from spreading which we will be encouraging.

We ask that if someone in your family is presenting with symptoms of COVID, you test for COVID. If a child tests positive, please let the office know and keep your child home for **5 days** please. We appreciate your cooperation with this. Unfortunately, we do not have COVID tests at school, they will need to be purchased from stores.

If your child has sickness or diarrhea, they should remain at home for 48 hours after the last episode. Thank you for your cooperation to help stop the spread of sickness in our community.

- observe your child, assess their understanding of what we are doing in school, and work with them to find out what is causing difficulty.
- Your child may be placed on the SEND register and we will be informed of this.
- Support will be put into place to support your child's learning.



We all have different things that make us unique and special.


Stephen Wiltshire

The Stephen Wiltshire Centre is a purpose-built specialist centre for children with special educational needs and/or disabilities (SEND) and their families, who live in Hammersmith & Fulham. The Centre is named after Stephen Wiltshire; an artist who has autism and attended Queensmill School in Hammersmith. The Centre opened on the 12th March 2018.

This specialist hub is delivering a range of activities, information and support in partnership with local services and agencies - families can meet professionals and peers, as well as take part in family fun days, drop in advice sessions and short breaks including holiday schemes.



The older children had an assembly on Neurodiversity and celebrated our unique strengths and differences. We talked about ways we can respect our differences and how we can help each other to learn.



- Narrative planners/structures (who, what, where, when,
- Forced alternatives/choices e.g. 'does positive mean something good or bad?'
- · Explicitly teach grammatical rules and structures
- Practice/rehearse with the student what they are going to say before they share it with the group or class.
- Rephrase what they have said in the correct grammar (but don't make them say it)



Tell them



- When you don't understand them.
- Strategies: tell me with different words, slow down, speak more loudly, show me what you mean etc.



Vocabulary

- Highlight key words
- Explain them: Identify challenging words before the lesson and pre-teach it
- Draw them







What age is Roblox for?

"Roblox doesn't specify a minimum age. Users of any age can create and join groups, chat, and interact with others. Such an open approach can pose some risks to kids, especially younger ones. And though Roblox has some safety precautions in place, it remains a target for people with less-than-good intentions." - Common Sense Media

Still, because of the learning potential Roblox offers, Common Sense Media rates it OK for <u>users age 13+</u>. Help your kids protect themselves by enabling privacy settings and teaching them how to be safe online.
